The service includes assessments in police custody to support diversion, provide psycho-social interventions through one-to-one and group support as well as providing clinical treatment using medications such as Methadone and Buprenorphine. It ensures continuity of care from prison to community, including pre-release support at HMP Usk, Prescoed, Cardiff and Swansea	To reduce the use of illicit or non prescribed drugs, to reduce problems related to drug and alcohol misuse, to support independence and develop good relationships with other services. To improve health and social functioning, and offer appropriate levels of support. To support completion of treatment packages if needed, and empower service users to achieve and maintain recovery.
